Violence is when people hurt other people.

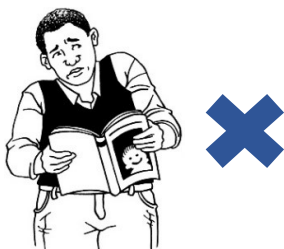
Easy Read information has pictures to help people understand the words.

If you do not feel safe right now call the Police on **111**.

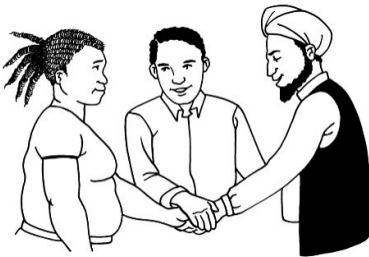


If you are worried or concerned after reading this document you can talk about it with:

What is the Joint Venture?



The Joint Venture is 10 different government agencies working together to stop:

- **sexual violence**
- **family violence**



Sexual violence is making you do sexual things when you do not want to.



Sexual violence does not have to mean someone touching you.

For example someone making you watch **pornography** is sexual violence.



Pornography is pictures or film of people having sex.



Family violence is violence by:

- your partner
- someone in your family
- someone you live with
- someone you have a close personal relationship with like:
 - someone you are dating
 - a carer.





Family violence can take different forms like:

- sexual violence
- physical violence like hitting you
- financial abuse like not letting you spend your money
- emotional abuse like calling you names.



Family violence can also mean:

- not giving you the care you need
- not letting you see a doctor.

Our vision



A **vision** is how we want things to be.

The vision of the Joint Venture is for family and sexual violence in Aotearoa New Zealand to stop.



This will mean people can be:

- safe
- well
- **thriving.**



Thriving means living your life well.



To make this vision happen:

- there needs to be lots more work on stopping violence
- tangata whenua and communities need to have the power to lead changes that fit:
 - their needs
 - what is important to them.



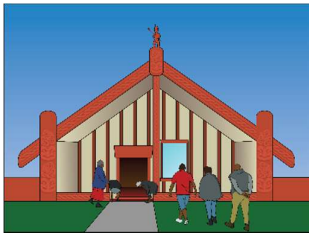
Focus areas



Focus areas are the things we want to put most work into.

There are **7** focus areas.

The focus areas are:



1. Recognise **te ao Māori**.

Te ao Māori is the Māori way of understanding the world.



2. Different parts of government working closely together.



The focus areas are:

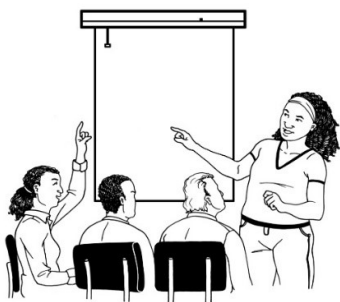
3. Recognise ways of stopping violence that are led by:

- **tangata whenua**
- communities.



Tangata whenua is another way of saying Māori.

4. Support people whose jobs mean they can be part of stopping family violence and sexual violence.



This can be people whose job is to stop violence.



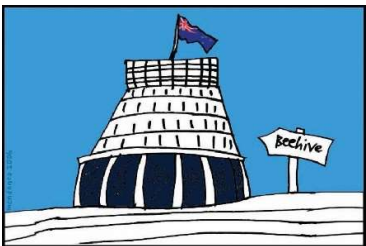
It can also mean people who may see people at work who have experienced violence.



More support means these people will know what to do if they find out about violence.



5. Put more work into stopping violence happening in the first place.



6. Make ways for the government to make changes.



7. Make it so everyone can keep:

- learning
- making things better.

We are asking you to **have your say** about stopping family and sexual violence.



You can have your say until:

30 June 2021.



Some of the groups of people we most want to hear from are:

- Tangata Whenua / Māori
- people who have had violence done to them
- people who use violence
- Pacific peoples
- disabled people.



We also most want to hear from:



- **new migrant and refugee communities**
- **ethnic communities.**



New migrants and refugees are people new to New Zealand.



Ethnic communities are people whose families are from places like:

- Asia
- Africa
- Latin America.





We also most want to hear from:

- older people
- tamariki and rangatahi / children and young people
- **rainbow communities.**



Rainbow communities mean people who are:

- lesbian
- gay
- bisexual
- transgender
- questioning which means not sure what words best fit them.





Rainbow communities also mean people who are:

- intersex
- asexual
- takatāpui
- use other similar words to talk about themselves.

1. How do you keep people safe in your:

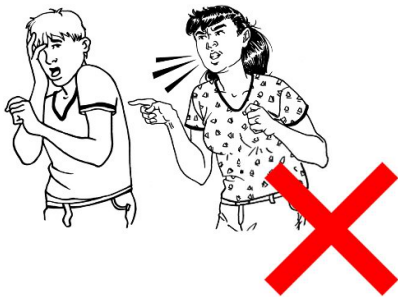
- whānau

How to have your say



There are 3 ways you can have your say:



1. at a hui / meeting

2. filling in an online survey



3. making a submission – this is when you send us something that tells us about what you think.

1. Hui / meeting



There will be hui organised by different groups.

Only people who are invited will go to the hui.



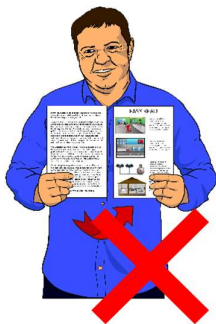
You may get invited by a group you are part of.

2. Online survey

- with other people.



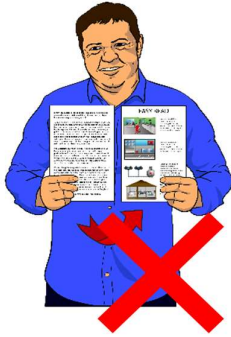
A submission could be:

Our **National Strategy** will say what we agree needs to be done to stop family and sexual violence in Aotearoa New Zealand.



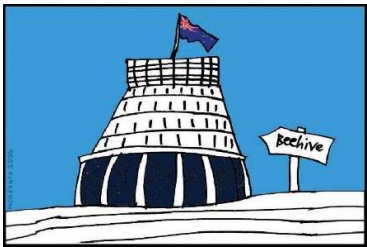
Our **Action Plans** will make sure we:
